I am pleased to share this year's Impact Report - a reflection of the lives we have touched, the partnerships we have built, and the progress we have made together.

This year, the BHC Impact Fund reached a powerful milestone: 589 people, nearly one in every three residents in our BHC housing portfolio, received some form of support or assistance.

That's not just a number. It's a reflection of the deep care and commitment that drives our work. From furnishing homes and funding education, to supporting wellbeing and community connection, the Impact Fund is helping people feel safe, supported, and seen.

The Fund was launched initially with funding from Elevate Residential, our profit-for-purpose real estate agency, with a commitment to donate an annual minimum of \$150,000. This laid the foundation for a program that has grown into a vital source of support for our residents. Today, we are joined by a growing community of generous supporters who believe in the power of housing to change lives, and we could not be more grateful.

This work directly supports one of BHC's strategic objectives in supporting our residents and communities to thrive. As we approach the conclusion of our Strategic Plan 2021-2025, we are incredibly proud of the work that has been done by BHC, Elevate Residential, and our valued supporters in helping us deliver on that goal. Together, we have created more than housing, we have created opportunities, stability, and a sense of belonging.

The Impact Fund is more than financial assistance. It's a reminder that behind every door is a story, and behind every story is a person who matters.

Kickstart Grant

Providing equipment and relief to assist residents with day-to-day living costs and to support tenancy sustainment.

Bright Futures Recipient

Funding futures, one note at a time

For Gavan and his family, BHC's Bright Futures Grant was more than financial support – it was a spark that reignited a love of music and opened doors to new possibilities.

Eight-year-old Ethon, Gavan's eldest son, had always been drawn to music. Inspired by his dad's love for AC/DC, Ethon started learning to play a junior electric guitar. When the family received the Bright Futures Grant, they were able to upgrade to a better instrument and continue lessons that had been previously been out of reach.

"Ethon has always been into music - he loves AC/DC, like me," Gavan shares.

"When we found out we had been successful for the grant he said, 'I can play more AC/DC songs Dad!' He was ecstatic."

The impact was immediate. Ethon's confidence soared. He recently brought his electric guitar to school and performed for his class, transforming from a quiet student to someone his classmates admired.

"He has changed big time. He's become an extrovert, more confident in school. He's never been the popular kid, but now kids are looking up to him."

When the next round of grants opened, Gavan didn't hesitate to apply for his younger son, Eulan (7), who had shown interest in learning the keyboard.

"Receiving the grant for Eulan's keyboard lessons helped us a lot. We saved up and bought him a decent keyboard for his birthday."

The boys now practice three times a week and are currently working together to learn "Don't Stop Believing" and hope to perform a mini concert for BHC staff. Ethon reads sheet music while Eulan learns by numbers, each developing their own style of learning. Their younger sister Emmelia, who loves to sing, is eager to join in - forming what Gavan proudly calls the "family band".

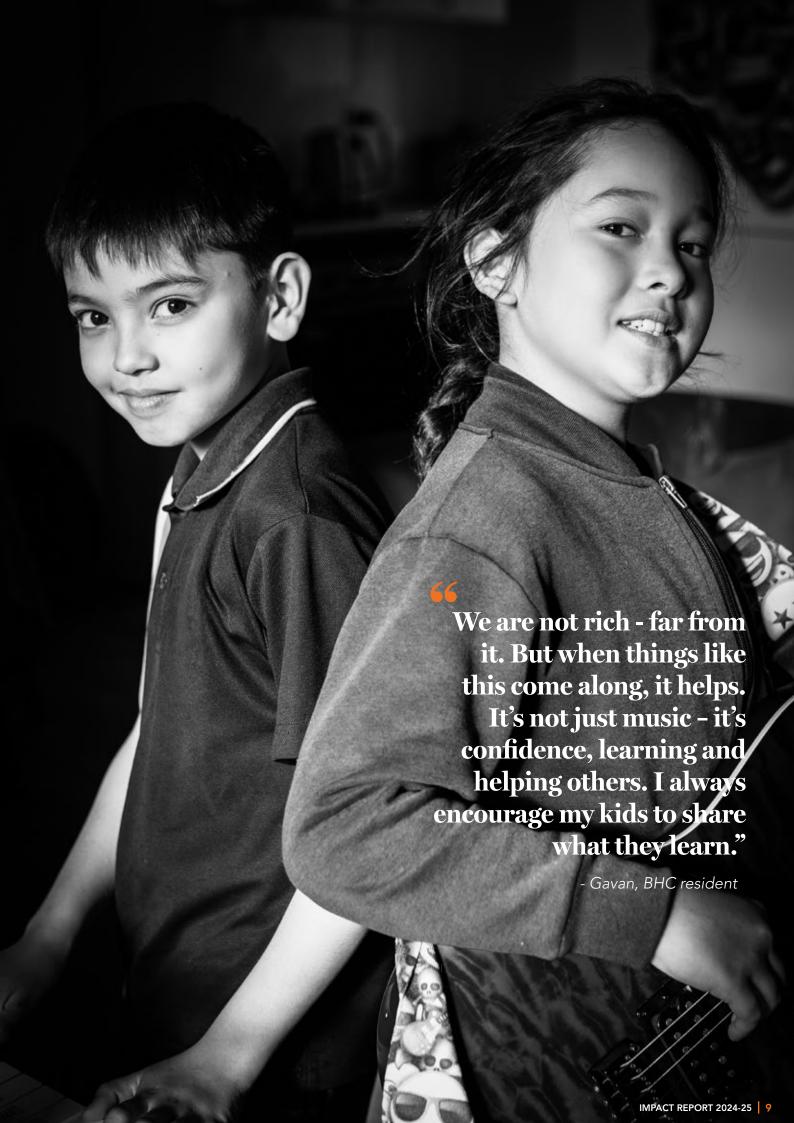
Gavan reflects on how the grants have changed their lives, not just financially, but emotionally and educationally.

"We are not rich - far from it. But when things like this come along, it helps. It's not just music - it's confidence, learning and helping others. I always encourage my kids to share what they learn."

As their home fills with the sounds of guitar riffs, keyboard melodies, and Emmelia's singing, the family's journey stands as a testament to what's possible when children are given the chance to thrive, one note at a time.

The need for informal, traumainformed mental health support continues. Many residents respond best to familiar, low-barrier access (e.g. phone or casual drop-ins). Crisis escalation is often reduced when support is consistent. The biggest barrier is still navigating mainstream mental health systems, especially for residents with multiple vulnerabilities or distrust of services."

Program two

Assisting residents to increase social inclusion, wellbeing and health

With the increasing challenges of social isolation, mental health and overall wellbeing, we have collaborated with community partners to deliver programs that support overall mental health and wellbeing.

The Counselling Project

BHC partnership with a private counselling service

Providing immediate therapeutic counselling for BHC residents facing mental health challenges, alongside continuous support to navigate the mental health system. This initiative fosters improved individual wellbeing, strengthens community ties, and mitigates social isolation, mental health decline and antisocial behaviour.

Over the year, 35 residents have been provided free, professional counselling support. In addition to this, referrals have been made to other local services including GP care, mental health therapy and city detox services.

Rent and Recover Program

BHC partnership with rehabilitation providers

BHC developed a program to allow residents impacted by drug and alcohol usage to be supported to attend a rehabilitation clinic.

This program empowers residents to seek proactive assistance while effectively managing their financial commitments, therefore enabling them to sustain their tenancy long term and take significant steps towards recovery.

Program three

Resident Participation and Employment Support

BHC's Resident Participation and Employment Coordinator RPEC) provides personalised support to BHC residents to assist with their education, employment and participation goals.

RPEC areas of focus include assisting with job seeking, interview preparation and skills building; facilitating and supporting volunteering, education and employment placements; and linking residents into relevant external services.

Outcomes Achieved



Residents supported through volunteer and participation opportunities

Substation 33 Warehouse, Northey Street City Farm, volunteering opportunities at the Royal Queensland Show (Ekka), connection to Men's Sheds.



Facilitated paid employment opportunities

Woolworths, retail and hospitality positions, community care and aged care, childcare and commercial cleaning, paid work for the Federal Election on voting day.

Residents assisted with education and training opportunities

First Aid Certificate, Responsible Service Alcohol Certification, Certificate III in Childcare, registration renewals (e.g. white card, forklift, car licences), enrolment in TAFE courses.

Participation support for residents including interview coaching, advocacy support and referrals, Disability Employment Services connections, digital literary education and training, mental health and alcohol and other drug treatment support.

Facilitated partnerships with Substation 33, Breakthru Employment, Optus, Yeronga Community Centre (Community Plus), Orange Sky, Drug Arm, Mission Australia (Inala), Goods360, TAFE Old and attended and supported job-networking opportunities.

After recently being diagnosed with White Matter Disease, which can lead to cognitive and physical impairments, BHC resident Mary was determined to think positively and not to just sit idle.

"I don't want to have the attitude of just living day to day. I want to better things as much as I can," Mary describes.

Following her doctor's advice, Mary looked for ways to improve her physical health and cognitive function. Each morning, she begins her day by walking her Staffy cross Jack Russell, Molly, around her neighbourhood, followed by completing the New York Times Wordle game.

"Each morning, I compete with my daughter to see who can get it correct in the least number of guesses. I've played for a few years now and I'm not too bad," says Mary.

Motivated to do more, Mary contacted BHC's Resident Participation and Employment Coordinator, Anthony, requesting education assistance as a mature age student.

"Mary's main goal was to undertake a Tafe course to stimulate her memory function and meet new people. However, her current computer literacy is basic and needed improvement before further study," Anthony details.

Through BHC's Kickstart Grant, Anthony was able to secure a refurbished laptop from Substation33, a social enterprise based in the Logan region that focuses on the reuse and recycling of electronic waste. This laptop would suit Mary's current use for study and education.

Understanding Mary's need to improve her computer literacy, Anthony found an inexpensive course through Aspley Classes for Seniors, which offers a range of courses, including a computer course for beginners.

"I'm nervous, excited and anxious. But I'm pushing myself to have a crack at it. It's just the basics, but it's a start and it will get me interacting socially while getting my brain moving," says Mary.

Following the completion of the 7-week course, Mary and Anthony will continue to work together to achieve her goal of completing a TAFE course.

"I'm so grateful for the support I've received. I don't talk to a lot of people, but I felt comfortable around him [Anthony]. He is actually trying to help. No one has ever helped me like this. I'm not going to disappoint," Mary expresses.

Mary's journey is a testament to the Impact Fund's commitment to supporting residents and communities to thrive.

Care where it counts

Home and **Health Program**

In 2023, BHC received a three-year, \$157,184 grant from Brisbane City Council's Pathways out of Homelessness program to deliver the Home and Health Program, supporting the health and wellbeing of residents in BHC and Bric Housing properties. The program is cofunded by BHC's Impact Fund (\$25K annually) and supported by a \$10K donation (this financial year) from the **Queensland Presentation Sisters.**

Delivered in partnership with OneBridge, the program brings place-based healthcare directly to residents, providing wound care, health education, specialist referrals, and support for mental health and substance use.

In the past financial year, there were:

- 171 clinics held (121 at BHC, 50 at Bric)
- 267 medication conversations
- 145 drug and alcohol support engagements
- 336 general health conversations
- 18 suicide prevention interventions
- 88% of residents accessing the service sustained their tenancies
- 170 new patients were engaged, helping reduce emergency department visits

The program has been pivotal in early detection of skin cancers, diabetes management, and improving health literacy, especially in wound care, dental hygiene, and medication use.

Key program partners include BHC, Bric Housing, OneBridge, and a network of collaborators such as Substation33, Drug Arm, Moonyah and TAFE Queensland, Optus and Good 360.

This year also saw the completion of a Dental Pilot with OneBridge, identifying critical needs across the portfolio. Based on its success, the pilot will expand into a full dental and hygiene support program, funded by the Impact Fund in the coming year.

BHC is redefining what's possible when housing and health come together with purpose. Their visionary leadership and partnership with OneBridge demonstrate that community housing can be a launchpad for equity, dignity, and wellbeing. Together, we're not just meeting needs, we're reimagining systems, uplifting lives, and proving that bold collaboration can build a healthier, fairer future for all."

Project 55

Property Management with Impact

In response to the growing number of older women facing housing insecurity, Elevate Residential and BHC launched Project 55 in May 2023, a targeted initiative to provide safe, affordable housing for women aged 55 and over at risk of homelessness.

Through Project 55, property owners partner with Elevate Residential to manage their investments, with 100% of profits directed to supporting housing at a BHC inner-city property. The innovative model now provides stable homes for 11 women, including those previously living in cars, facing unaffordable rent hikes, or relying on temporary accommodation.

Residents have shared their appreciation for the property's comfort, location, and sense of community.

To further enhance the living environment, BHC secured funding from the Queensland Government's Gambling Community Benefit Fund, enabling upgrades and landscaping improvements.

Originally planned as a one-year pilot, Project 55 will continue, thanks to its success and the ongoing commitment of Elevate Residential and participating property owners. It stands as a powerful example of how ethical property management can directly improve lives.

Rosita's Story

A journey to independence

After 20 years of living with her adult children, Rosita, at the age of 70 decided it was time to embrace her independence.

"I wanted to do things on my own. As much as I love my children and grandchildren, I wanted to retire," Rosita shares.

Rosita reached out to the Fortitude Valley Housing Service Centre and was referred to Communify. With their help, she connected with BHC's Housing Manager, Annie, who invited Rosita to view one of BHC's properties supporting women aged over 55. Rosita liked it immediately and moved in with her family's support.

"I was over the moon. For the first time I was doing my own thing," Rosita said.

Since moving in, Rosita has flourished in her independence. She takes the bus early every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning to visit her gym in Chermside. She also visits the New Farm Neighbourhood Centre each week, where she enjoys a tea and chat and picks up a free fruit and vegetable parcel, often using them to make soup or other meals at home.

"I'm starting to know everyone there and I feel very comfortable at the community centre."

While living independently in an apartment for the first time, Rosita remains closely connected with her family, visiting her children and grandchildren every weekend.

"Living on my own, wouldn't have been possible if I didn't find something affordable for me. This space is perfect for me, and I feel truly happy here," Rosita explains.
